The Scholarship

This will be an externally funded scholarship and is separate from the SALIS PhD Scholarship 2024 call.

This PhD scholarship, subject to final confirmation of funding, will cover full-time fees for a maximum of 4 years and provide a stipend with a value of up to €22,000 p.a. for a maximum of 4 years, subject to satisfactory progression.

The successful applicant will receive the mentorship of top researchers and pioneers in the field, led by Prof Sharon O'Brien, Dr Patrick Cadwell, and Dr Aline Larroyed and will be part of a vibrant multilingual and multicultural research community, with a supportive atmosphere for interdisciplinary research. The student may also receive financial assistance for activities such as fieldwork and conferences, subject to certain conditions.

The successful applicant will start their PhD on 2nd September 2024 and is expected to reside full-time in Ireland.

Eligibility Criteria and Preferred Profile

Eligibility Applicants must:

- Hold a relevant undergraduate degree at first- or second-class honours, grade one (or equivalent);
- 2. Hold a Masters' qualification in Translation Studies or a cognate discipline at first- or second-class honours, grade one (or equivalent);
- 3. Satisfy DCU's English language criteria, available for review here: <u>DCU English</u> Language Requirements.

A background or prior experience in crisis translation, translation technologies, or human rights is highly advantageous. Fluency in Spanish and/or (Brazilian) Portuguese at a high level is highly desirable.
